



Vocab:

Textiles: A type of cloth or woven fabric.

Sew/stitch: A link or loop made by sewing, knitting, or needlework.

Attach: To join or fasten something to something else.

Seem: Line here two pieces of fabric are joined.

Applique: Ornamental needlework sewn on to a larger piece of fabric to form a picture or pattern.

Fibre: A thread from textiles.

Weave: Fabric formed by interlacing threads.

Woven: A textile formed from weaving.

Cotton: A textile made from cotton fibres.

Key Skills and Knowledge:

- Joins must be secure or the flaps will become detached.
- Which method of joining is most appropriate?
- All things are designed with specific purpose and audience.
- Designs and prototypes need to be evaluated and adapted based on need.
- An appropriate stitch is required. Think about what you want to achieve with the stitch? Attach a decoration or join two materials?
- Appropriate thread needs to selected- too thin may not be strong enough. Too thick and it may look clumpy and untidy.

Fabric books with hide and seek flaps and pockets have been popular with babies and toddlers for decades. They are popular with parents too as they are soft and delight, making them safe for babies and young children. The hide and seek pockets create a game within the book and added interest for the child exploring them.
